Meditation

Read Psalm 19

Where do you see God? Some people see God in the glory of creation. They are inspired by a beautiful sunset or by the wonders of nature. Some people see God in the faces of other human beings. Some see him in the words of inspired Scripture, and some in prayer or in the majesty and power of worship. Some see him in the simple and ordinary things of life.

Where do you see God? In reality God is everywhere, even if we don't see or acknowledge his presence. In Psalm 139:7-10 we read,

⁷Where can I go from your spirit?

Or where can I flee from your presence?

⁸If I ascend to heaven, you are there;

if I make my bed in Sheol, you are there.

⁹If I take the wings of the morning

and settle at the farthest limits of the sea,

¹⁰even there your hand shall lead me,

and your right hand shall hold me fast.

If God is everywhere, why don't we always have a sense of his presence?

Often we don't see God because we're not looking for him. Our minds are on other things, or we focus on our own needs and our own feelings, or we don't expect God's presence, or we're not accustomed to seeing him in everyday life.

Where do you see God? He is there in every moment of our lives. If we are willing to see, the Holy Spirit will open our eyes to his presence. We'll begin to ask questions such as "Lord, where are you in this situation?" "What's your purpose for me?" "What's your purpose for others?" "What can I do to show your love and your light?" He may simply reassure us and remind us of his love and providence, and so we learn to thank him and praise him in all things. But he may reveal a deeper purpose for us.


To understand God's intent we seek to learn the language of his heart. God speaks to us in a variety of ways. He spoke to Moses through the burning bush (Ex. 3). He spoke to Samuel through a voice in the night (1 Sam. 3). He spoke to King David through the voice of another person (2 Sam. 24:11-19). God communicates with each of us in different ways at different times. Through scripture and prayer, through worship and praise, through the experiences of others, and sometimes through trial and error we learn to understand God's voice in a variety of circumstances. We become especially sensitive to his gentle nudge in our hearts.

We know God's presence; we listen for his voice; God calls us to respond. We may respond to his love and reassurance with thanksgiving and praise. We may respond with questions. We may respond with actions and words that enable us to share his love with others.

Where do you see God? We spend a lifetime learning to experience his presence, to hear his voice, and to respond in love. May God grant us the grace of his Holy Spirit as he opens our eyes to see him

more clearly every day. Where do other people see God? Maybe they see him in you!

John Sammis was born in Brooklyn in 1846, and died in Los Angeles in 1919. He became a successful businessman in Indiana, where his volunteer work with the YMCA led him into the ordained ministry. He served several Presbyterian churches in the Midwest. Daniel Towner was born in Rome, PA, in 1850 and died in Missouri in 1919. He studied with several eminent musicians, and served in the music ministry of a number of Methodist Episcopal churches. He worked with Dwight Moody the evangelist, and eventually became head of the music department of Moody Bible Institute.

Towner was leading a testimony meeting with Moody when he heard a young man say, "I am not quite sure—but I am going to trust, and I am going to obey." He sent the words with their story to Sammis, who was inspired to write the hymn, *Trust and Obey*, beginning with the chorus. Towner then composed the tune. The hymn expresses in a simple yet powerful way the blessings of trusting and obeying the Lord. It may be found as number 467 in *The United Methodist Hymnal*.
