Meditation

Read Psalm 42, Philippians 4:4-7.

When I was walking on the battlefield (W. Confederate Ave.) early last Saturday evening, I saw a faint rainbow in the distance. Even though it only lasted a short while and was not as bright as some I've seen, it was still a beautiful sight.

Rainbows inspire us because they remind us of God's promises to us, and of God's faithfulness to his promises. They lift our eyes above earthly con-

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cerns and refocus them on God. Rainbows often appear during or after a storm (Saturday evening was an exception). They testify to God's unfailing love in the midst of a storm, and that the Lord is more powerful than any storms we may encounter. For me it was a sign of hope in the midst of this pandemic, and a reminder to trust in God. God is always our Good Shepherd.

Rainbows call us to praise God and rejoice in his love and his presence. Praise is our response to God's majesty and power. When we see the wonders of his creation, when we contemplate the cross and the depth of his love in Jesus Christ, when we see his image in the heart of another human being, we're inspired to praise him.

Praise is more that our response to God; it can be a weapon of spiritual warfare. In Psalm 42, the writer longs for God's presence when God can't be found. We sense the writer's despair and hopelessness: "My tears have been my food day and night, while people say to me all day long, 'Where is your God?" "Why, my soul, are you downcast? Why so disturbed within me?" Yet the psalmist is still able to say, "Put your hope in God, for I will yet praise him, my Savior and my God." Praising God overcomes our despair and our hopelessness; praise brings us into God's presence even when we don't feel his love; praise gives us victory over despair and darkness.


Praise can be like a rainbow that *we* create. It removes our focus on our current situation and our despair, and refocuses us on God's love and power. The light of praise drives away the darkness of our souls. We praise God because we know his promises and his faithfulness. We praise God for the gift of his Son and his Holy Spirit. We praise God for his constant presence with us. We praise God for his creative power and untiring work for peace with justice. Above all, we praise God for his amazing love for us, and for the ability and desire he gives us to love others in the same way.

Praise may be most significant when it's most diffi-

cult. In Philippians 4:4, Paul writes "Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: Rejoice!" In the face of persecution and trial, Paul knew that the joy of the Lord was his strength. We praise God when our souls are downcast and disturbed, when the last thing we feel like doing is praising him. As we face trials and difficulties, the doorway that opens our hearts to God's joy is often the doorway of praise and thanksgiving.

When difficulties come and God seems distant, picture in your mind the beauty and promise of a rainbow. Give praise and thanks to God in all circumstances, that the rainbow of joy may abide in your heart forever.

## America, the Beautiful

Kathryn Lee Bates, Samuel A. Ward

O beautiful for spacious skies,
For amber waves of grain,
For purple mountain majesties
Above the fruited plain!
America! America!
God shed his grace on thee,
And crown thy good with brotherhood
From sea to shining sea!

O beautiful for heroes proved In liberating strife, Who more than self their country loved, And mercy more than life! America! America! May God thy gold refine, Till all success be nobleness, And every gain divine!

O beautiful for patriot dream
That sees beyond the years
Thine alabaster cities gleam,
Undimmed by human tears!
America! America!
God mend thine every flaw,
Confirm thy soul in self control,
Thy liberty in law.

Katherine Lee Bates (1859-1929) was born in Falmouth, Massachusetts. She was educated at Wellesley College, and eventually became head of the English department at her *alma mater*. She was the author or coauthor of over 20 books and collections. Samuel A. Ward was born in Newark, NJ in 1847. He studied music in New York, and operated a music store in Newark. He served as a church organist for many years and died in 1903.

The words were written during Katherine Bates's trip to Pike's Peak in 1893. Her journey across the country inspired many of the images in the hymn. Samuel Ward wrote the music in 1888 for another text. It was officially paired with Bates's words in 1912. The words and music together express a beautiful prayer for our nation. It may be found as No. 696 in *The United Methodist Hymnal*.
